Tiger Airways Starts Lining Up Goodies for New Work Year; Increased Frequencies, Discounted Fares & Early Bird Savings from April till February 2011

- Early Bird savings for travel till 28 February 2011
- \$0 + taxes and charges for travel on all international routes in May 2010; Book between 18 and 24 March
- Increased frequencies to Phuket, Krabi and Hat Yai from April

Singapore, 18 March 2010. Tiger Airways Singapore today announced the first lot of sweet deals for the new work year beginning in April.

Bookings are now open for travel up to 28 February 2011, which means great early bird savings especially for those traveling in 2011. For instance, flying from Singapore to Guangzhou in February 2011 costs as low as \$40 plus taxes if the booking is made now.

Rosalynn Tay, Managing Director of Tiger Airways Singapore, said, "From April, we can expect more visitors to Singapore when both Integrated Resorts have opened. In particular, we expect more demand for our Greater China routes during the 2011 Chinese New Year period. Opening our routes for booking way in advance will help travelers secure their seats at the lowest possible fares."

Tiger Airways currently flies to five Greater China destinations – Guangzhou, Haikou, Shenzhen, Hong Kong and Macau – and is considering increasing its pawprint to other cities such as Hangzhou, Shantou, Taipei and Xiamen.

Those planning to travel during the month of May 2010 get great deals too. Book between now and 24 March, and enjoy fares at \$0 plus taxes on all international flights. For instance, Singapore-Kuala Lumpur is only \$0+25, Singapore-Phuket \$0+52, and Singapore-Haikou only \$0+90.

These deals follow hot on the heels of last week's announcement on increased flights to Thailand. From April, popular holiday destination Phuket will have two additional weekend flights, bringing the total to 14 flights weekly. Krabi and Hat Yai flights will have daily flights, up from four and three flights per week, respectively.
